Sem's Peace and nonviolence

'Only the dead have seen the end of war.' -Plato

War has ravaged humanity and the Earth since time immemorial. Further exasperating the pain and suffering of war are the divisions, violence, and oppressions people experience caused by a myriad of issues, such as gender, race, ethnicity, sexuality, culture, creed, and class. The destruction of the environment and the impending climate catastrophe only adds more pain to an already hurting and broken humanity.

The urgent need to take action and break the cycle of death and despair falls now upon a new generation. The Christian Peacemaker Teams ask, "what would happen if Christians devoted the same discipline and self-sacrifice to nonviolent peacemaking that armies devote to war?" Another world is possible. Through peacemaking and direct action protests, change can occur. War can end, power and domination can be brought down, and an ecologically sound society can be created.

Central to the success of direct action social campaigns and peacemaking is the commitment of each person involved to a life of nonviolence. It is by this commitment to nonviolence that we model the community and the world we imagine, for if we seek change by any other means, we perpetuate the systems and structures of violence and end up changing nothing at all.

Together, let us wage peace, defeat war, and become, with God, co-creators of that beloved community where all are welcome and destruction and division are no more.

An Introduction to Nonviolent Peacemaking and Direct Action

Historically, nonviolent direct actions have been some of the most successful ways in which structures of oppression and domination have been toppled. From Gandhi's use of the nonviolent satyagraha during the Indian Independence Movement and Martin Luther King, Jr.'s nonviolent protest during the Civil Rights Movement, to the Solidarity Movement which toppled Soviet Imperialism in Poland, and the Philippines' People Power Revolution led by Corazon Aquino which toppled the authoritarian regime of Ferdinand Marcos, to the more contemporary examples such as the overthrow of Serbian dictator and war criminal, Slobodan Milosevic, and the restoration of democracy in Ukraine with the 2004 Orange Revolution which restored democracy and the deomcratically elected president, Victor Yushenko, nonviolent means have been used to achieve massive social and political change. At the same time, people around the world, in places such as Iraq, Colombia, Palestine-Israel, the African Great Lakes region, and the US-Mexico border, are actively making peace by placing themselves in harms way to secure peace and safety for others.

While both nonviolent peacemaking and nonviolent direct action require much commitment and intense training, they also require an inward conversion and self-cleanse from the forces of hate and violence within each of us. This devotional is meant as a first step on the path towards nonviolence – to awaken your curiosity to the power of nonviolence for positive change in the world, to provide a framework for praying for peace and

nonviolence, to help you turn away from the violence and domination of Empire, outside and within, and to guide you towards the path of peace and nonviolent social and political change.

*we will gather in a manner that reflects the world we choose to create. *we will promote an alternative to domination systems by acting with love, respect, mutuality, compassion, and acceptance for the interdependence of all life.

*we will struggle for a world free from violence and we will use actions, words and symbols consistent with this struggle.

*we will act with respect for the people and property of the local

Daily Prayers for Peace and Nonviolence

Below is an outline for a simple service that can be followed using the meditation verses, daily readings, and theological reflections found in this devotional. (Prayers are adapted from 'Midday Prayer' in The Anglican Church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia's A New Zealand Prayer Book, 1989.)

Begin with silent meditation on the daily verse.

Opening: Let us worship the God of love. Alleluia. Alleluia.

Daily Reading

Intercessions: Let us accept that we are profoundly loved and need never be afraid. (Silence) Let us be filled with the presence of the great compassion towards ourselves and towards all living things. (Silence) Realising that we are all nourished from the same source of life, may we so live that others be not deprived of air, food, water, shelter, or the chance to live. (Silence) Let us pray that we ourselves cease to be a cause of suffering to one another. (Silence) With humility let us pray for the establishment of peace in our hearts and on earth. (Silence)

Theological Reflection

Collect: May God kindle in us the fire of love to bring us alive and give warmth to the world. Lead me from death to life, from falsehood to truth; lead me from despair to hope, from fear to trust; lead me from hate to love, from war to peace. Let peace fill our hearts, our world, our universe. Amen.

Closing: The Divine Spirit dwells in us. Thanks be to God. Amen.

MONDAY

Peacemaking as Vocation

Come, behold the works of the Lord: see what desolations he has brought on the earth. He makes wars cease to the end of the earth; he breaks the bow, and shatters the spear; he burns the shields with fire. 'Be still, and know that I am God!
